N.Y.S.: Elec. Robert Fanning and William Wilson, representatives of the New York State Electric and Gas Co., advised that the village can rightfully charge a 1% utility tax. A public hearing would be necessary. Mr. Fanning advised that the tax is based on the gross revenue received by the Gas & Electric from the village residents which amounts to approximately \$700,000.00 per year which would net the village about \$7,000.00 payable quarterly. Mr. Fanning further advised that a resolution properly passed by the village board would be a requisite with a public hearing to follow.

Street Lights: With the possibility of receiving this additional revenue of \$7,000.00, it might be assumed that it would be apropos to completely up-date the village lighting scheme as outlined several years ago. To completely do this an approximate expenditure of \$7,000.00 would be needed in the lighting fund, A5182.4, per year or a total expenditure of approximately \$21,000.00 rather than \$14,000.00 as appropriated. Mr. Fanning and Mr. Wilson explained that it might be to the advantage of the village to seriously consider this in that to schedule the work and complete it would involve quite some time. The report indicated that of the 19 motor vehicle arrests, there were 9 apprehended for sspecking and 3 failed to keep right. Of the 8 Criminal matters handled by the department, 4 were for petit larceny. Total Fines and Bail Forfeitures collected during the month amounted to \$165.00 and parking meter fees netted the department \$33.00. In addition to the motor vehicle and criminal matters, 114 complaints were investigated by the police department along with assisting outside departments approximately 7 times and investigating 6 accidents.

Represenspoke relative to the facets of drug addiction, relating that
there are different phases of the problem. Generally addicts are kept for a period of 9 months in a rehabilitation center. It is now possible to license heretofore private facilities for handling the problem. Research is constantly continuing on methods of education, drugs and rehabilitation. The Narcotic Commission will go into schools to talk to teachers, Experience has proven that a calm parents and children. approach in attempting to educate the student is the best procedure, stressing the side effects of drug addiction. At the present time, a fairly accurate figure indicates that there are 63,000 addicts. In order to educate the public, there are professional training groups which will talk with doctors, church groups and any other groups who ask for assistance.

Wm.Roche: William Roche, contractor for the Professional Building on Profession-East Main Street between the property of Blankenberg Dairy and William Herman and opposite the intersection of Routes #31 and 21, discussed with the board the installation of water and sewer lines to his building. It is to be assumed that there will be 130-140' back to the lot line from the last manhole for sanitary sewer connection as per Dwg.#103--2. It was proposed that the sewer line be extended down the west side of their property line and connect into the village.

Hwy. Foreman Ray Smith is to check on this for the best possible solution. Before proceeding further, cost estimates for both a water and sewer line must be obtained from K.G. Woodward Associates, Webster, N.Y. Mayor D. Nussbaumer introduced William Roche, Agency Director of the Village of Palmyra Urban Renewal Program. William Roche prefaced his remarks by mentioning that in essence the Urban Renewal Program is approaching a third phase, the first was the Planning of Urban Renewal, the 2nd was the Acceptance of the Neighborhood Development Plan, which had to be scraped in that applications far exceeded the funds, and now the third phase or back to the original plan, which has been revised. Mr. Roche commented that there has been an improvement on Main Street in the last three years, an improvement initiated by the owners of the property. In addition, there has been a marked upsurge of interest by individuals who wished to make their thoughts known, rather than being acquiesce with a diffident and bnconcerned attitude, and allow the future to unfold without voicing an opinion.

Codes Passed:

In the last 3 years, he continued, the Village of Palmyra has passed and adopted the Zoning, Building, Housing, Fire and Plumbing Codes along with appointing a Zoning Officer to enforce the codes. In addition, the village anticipates within the next year to improve the sewerage treatment plant to include chlorination of the effluent.

Grant

Funds in the amount of \$900,000.00 have been allocated in Assigned: the name of the Village of Palmyra of which the Federal Government would contribute 3/4, the State of New York, 1/8 and

the Village of Palmyra would contribute 1/8.

Survey & Agency Director Roche further commented that in his opinion in Planning: the last 44 months, there has been all the survey and planning that was needed. It is now time to promote some execution and acquisition. The original plot contained 12 acres of which 1/2 seemed to revolve around a heated argument. With the inthoduction of the Neighborhood Development Plan, a "bitesize" in comparison to the original plan, it appeared that the Urban Renewal Agency could have gone into live action, but as reiterated previously, sufficient funds were not available or forthcoming from the government. However, the government has assured the agency that since application was made for the N.D.P., the agency would not be penalized but would be given a preference in receiving the original funds so allocated in our name.

Acquisit. The present acquisition budget for lands in question amounts to approximately \$700,000.00 Separate appraisals are given relative to the lands in question. Already 2 have been done and undoubtedly a third would be undertaken, he commented. In summation, Mr. Roche continued, in all probability something will be done within the next 8 months to acquire the property on the north side of Canal Street.

Adjourn: Mayor Nussbaumer adjourned the information meeting at 8:45 P.M.
